Colorado Music Festival Announces Return of Summer Concert Season Featuring Orchestral and Chamber Music from June 30 to August 7

The renowned annual festival will feature six weeks of in-person concerts

BOULDER, CO. (January 19, 2022) — <u>Colorado Music Festival</u> (CMF) presents its annual summer concert season from June 30 to August 7 at Chautauqua Auditorium in Boulder, with 22 orchestral and chamber music performances by the Colorado Music Festival Orchestra and visiting artists, as well as a variety of related educational programming.

The festival features world-class musicians from around the country who perform in Boulder as the Colorado Music Festival Orchestra under the direction of music director Peter Oundjian. The 2022 festival includes 13 guest artists, three internationally-acclaimed string quartets, and four guest conductors.

"We are thrilled to celebrate the return of our full, Mahler-sized symphony orchestra to the stage of Chautauqua this year," said Peter Oundjian, music director. "After a long period of missing the magical sound of a large orchestra in person, we have a renewed sense of gratitude for the ability to share the greatest orchestral music with our community once again."

Tickets to the 2022 Festival will be available for purchase on <u>the CMF website</u> beginning March 1.

Highlights of this year's Colorado Music Festival include:

- This year's composer-in-residence John Adams, one of the world's preeminent composers, who will co-conduct two concerts and has co-curated the festival's Music of Today week
- Three premieres, including a world premiere commissioned work by Timo Andres performed on July 14; a world premiere by Wang Jie, *Flying on the Scaly Backs of Our Mountains*, on August 4; and a Colorado premiere and co-commission by Wynton Marsalis on August 7
- The second year of the Robert Mann Chamber Music Series, named for Robert Mann, composer, conductor, and founding first violin of the Juilliard String Quartet, featuring three acclaimed quartets: this year's artists-in-residence, Boulder's own Grammy Award-winning Takács Quartet, open the festival with repeat performances of John Adams' *Absolute Jest* on June 30 and July 1 and works by Haydn, Coleridge-Taylor, and Dvořák on July 5; New York's Attacca Quartet plays a collection of contemporary pieces, including works by John Adams,

Caroline Shaw, and Philip Glass, on July 12; the Danish String Quartet plays a delightful and unusual collection of folk music on August 2

- Music of Today week, from July 11 to 17, which gives concertgoers the opportunity to hear a range of contemporary works from living composers, co-curated by music director Peter Oundjian and composer-in-residence John Adams, who will conduct his own *City Noir* on July 14 and *Must the Devil Have All the Good Tunes?* on July 17
- The return of CMF's Kaleidoscope concert on July 15, which adds theatrical elements such as lighting and cinematography to a concert centered around John Adams' *Road Movies*
- A one-night-only performance of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, including a dramatic reading by actor John de Lancie, known for his role in *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, on July 31
- A diverse roster of musicians, conductors, and composers, including Ryan Bancroft, Randall Goosby, Wang Jie, Anthony McGill, and Gabriela Montero

The annual CMF family concert returns on Sunday, July 3, with a performance of *Tubby the Tuba* by vaudeville-inspired musical storytellers Really Inventive Stuff. This program also includes Benjamin Britten's classic *Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra*. The family concert is a hallmark of CMF and designed to introduce children to orchestral performances in a fun, approachable manner.

CMF will follow recommended and required Covid guidelines as necessary during the 2022 season.

"We can't wait to see our subscribers, long-time patrons, and new guests this summer," said Elizabeth McGuire, executive director of CMF. "We couldn't be happier that we can host a full, in-person festival once again."

Colorado Music Festival concerts take place at Chautauqua Auditorium, which was built in 1898. Located at the base of Boulder's Flatirons and one of only 25 National Historic Landmarks in the state of Colorado, the Colorado Chautauqua remains committed to its historic purpose, offering outstanding cultural and educational programs and attracting more than a million visitors each year.
